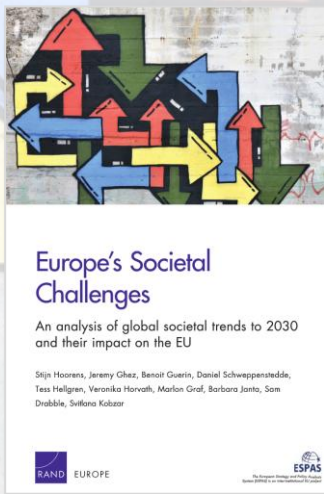

- Young people have been particularly hit by the economic crisis potentially causing a 'lost generation'
- The societal costs of large groups of young people not in education or employment are significant
- Other groups at risk include: households with members older than 65, single person and single parent households
- The proportion of these households is expected to increase over the next decades

....resulting in increasing inequality



The creation of a 'lost generation'?

Impact of being a NEET (compared with non-NEET)

14 million young people (14-29 years old) in the EU are NEETs

High NEET rates (15-29 year olds)



Social participation rate drops from
100% for young people in attachment to
10% for NEETs

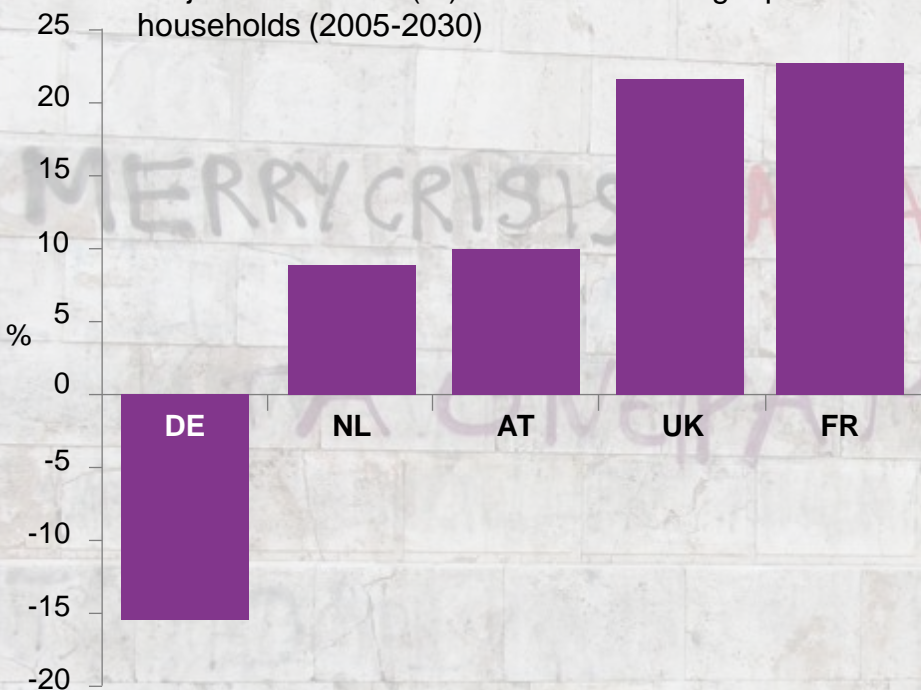


Single parent households expected to increase
