Aristotelis Tzafalias, DG Connect European Commission

Aristoteles Tzafalias is a Policy Officer in the Unit 'Cybersecurity and Digital Privacy' within the European Commission in Brussels (Directorate-General Communication Networks, Content and Technology). Mr Tzafalias is dealing with a range of topics including ICT Security Certification, the CSIRT Network and e-Privacy and works closely with other Commission Services and the European External Action Service on cybersecurity policy in areas such as financial services, trade, cybercrime and law enforcement.

Before joining the European Commission, he was employed by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Greece where he was an advisor to the Ministry's CISO and liaison with the Greek National Security Agency and National Accreditation Authority on matters of compliance and accreditation. Mr Tzafalias has also served in the Greek Embassies in Islamabad and Damascus. Mr Tzafalias studied Computer Science at the University of Crete in Heraklion.

Jan Neutze, Microsoft

Jan Neutze is Director of Cybersecurity Policy at Microsoft responsible for Europe, Middle East, and Africa (EMEA). In this role Jan works with policy and technical stakeholders on a range of cybersecurity issues, including security strategy and policy, cloud security, risk management, information assurance and critical infrastructure protection. In 2015, Jan was appointed to the ENISA Permanent Stakeholders' Group (PSG) for the 2015-2017 term.

Before taking on Microsoft's EMEA cybersecurity portfolio in 2013, Jan worked in Microsoft's Trustworthy Computing (TwC) group at Microsoft Corp. in Redmond, WA focusing on cybersecurity public policy, cloud security and cybersecurity norms, as well as engaging with partners from government, international organizations, and academia.

Jan came to Microsoft from the United Nations Headquarters where he served for three years in the policy planning staff of the UN Secretary-General and the Department of Political Affairs, leading a range of cybersecurity and counterterrorism projects. Prior to his work at the UN, Jan led a range of transatlantic security policy projects at the German Marshall Fund of the United States and the Atlantic Council of the United States.

Jan is a Certified Information Systems Security Professional (CISSP) and a Certified Information Privacy Professional (CIPP) and holds a J.D. from the University of Muenster, Germany as well as an M.A. in Security Studies from Georgetown University in Washington, DC.

Philippe Cotelte graduated as an Engineer from Ecole Nationale Supérieure de l'Aéronautique et de l'Espace and Executive MBA from Essec & Mannheim 2007.

Ilias Chantzios, Symantec

Ilias Chantzios is Senior Director of Symantec's Government Affairs programmes for Europe, Middle East & Africa (EMEA) and Asia Pacific Japan (APJ). He is also the Global Advisor for Critical Infrastructure and Data Protection. Chantzios represents Symantec before government bodies, national authorities and international organisations advising on public policy issues with particular regard to IT security and privacy.

Before joining Symantec in 2004, Chantzios worked as legal and policy officer in the Directorate General Information Society of the European Commission focusing on information security policy. He covered the Council of Europe Cybercrime Convention and the Framework Decision on Attacks against Information Systems. In addition, he worked on a number of EU legislative initiatives relevant to information society and security, including directives on Privacy on Electronic Communications, the Data Retention Directive and the European Network and Information Security Agency (ENISA). He also represented the European Commission in various international debates and conferences.

Chantzios holds a law degree from the Aristotle University, an Erasmus degree from the University of Limburg, a Master degree in Computers and Communication Law from Queen Mary College, University of London and a Master in Business Administration from Solvay Business School. J. Michael Daniel, President, Cyber Threat Alliance

Michael Daniel currently serves as the President of the Cyber Threat Alliance (CTA). CTA works to improve the cybersecurity of our global digital ecosystem by enabling real-time, high-quality cyber threat information sharing among companies and organizations in the cybersecurity field.

Prior to CTA, Michael served as Special Assistant to the President and Cybersecurity Coordinator on the National Security Council Staff. He held this position from June 2012 to January 2017. In this role, Michael led the development of national cybersecurity strategy and policy, and he oversaw implementation of those policies. Michael also ensured that the federal government effectively partnered with the private sector, non-governmental organizations, other branches and levels of government, and other nations. Prior to coming to the National Security Council Staff, Michael served for 17 years with the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). From September 2001 to June 2012, he served as the Chief of the Intelligence Branch, National Security Division, in a career Senior Executive Service position.

Originally from Atlanta, Michael received a Bachelor's in Public Policy from the Woodrow Wilson School at Princeton University. Subsequently, he obtained a Master's in Public Policy from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard with a focus on International Affairs and Security. Michael also obtained a Master of Science in National Resource Strategy from the National Defense University's Industrial College of the Armed Forces in 2001

Allan Friedman, National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA)

Allan Friedman is Director of Cybersecurity at the National Telecommunications and Information Administration in the US Department of Commerce. He coordinates NTIA's multistakeholder processes on cybersecurity, including the initiatives on vulnerability disclosure and IoT security patching.

Prior to joining the Federal Government, Friedman spent fifteen years as a noted cybersecurity and technology policy researcher at Harvard's Computer Science Department, the Brookings Institution, and George Washington University's Engineering School. He has a degree in computer science from Swarthmore College and a Ph.D. in public policy from Harvard University, and is the Co-Author of "Cybersecurity and Cyberwar: What Everyone Needs to Know".

Marietje Schaake, Member of European Parliament (MEP)

Marietje Schaake has been serving as a Member of the European Parliament for the Dutch Democratic Party (D66) with the Alliance of Liberals and Democrats for Europe (ALDE) political group since 2009. She serves on the International Trade committee and is the spokesperson for the ALDE Group on the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP). Schaake also serves on the committee on Foreign Affairs and the subcommittee on Human Rights. She is the founder of the European Parliament Intergroup on the Digital Agenda for Europe. Furthermore, Marietje Schaake is the Vice-President of the US Delegation and serves on the Iran Delegation and the Delegation for the Arab peninsula. She is a Member of the Global Commission on the Stability of Cyberspace and is a Young Global Leader and a Member of the Global Future Council on Future of Digital Economy and Society with the WEF.

Monika Kopchava, Council of the European Union

Mrs. Monika Kopcheva joined the General Secretariat of the European Council in 2007 after the accession of Bulgaria. Currently she is a Political Administrator within the Unit for Judicial cooperation in criminal matters at the Directorate General for Justice and Home Affairs. Since 2013 she is responsible for the EU Cyber Policy and supports the Presidency in running the Horizontal Working Party on Cyber Issues in the Council.

She holds a master degree on Law (Sofia University), on Human rights (CEU, Budapest) and a PhD on Computer crime (obtained in 2005, Bulgaria). Since 2016 Mrs Kopcheva is a lecturer on Approximation of EU Criminal Law at the Luxembourg University.
